RE: EXHIBITION OF GAMING MACHINES

In response to your email dated February 9, 2009, this will confirm the requirements relating to the exhibition of gaming machines at the Canadian Gaming Summit to be held at Caesars Windsor from April 26 to May 01, 2009. We understand that:

- a) April 26-28 will be the Exhibitor set up day and exhibitor move-in;
- b) April 28-30 conference;
- c) April 29-30 exhibition;
- d) April 30-May 01 show closes at 17:30 p.m. on April 30 with move-out completed by 18:00 on May 1.

As in the past, please be advised that it is the responsibility of the participating companies to ensure they comply with the Criminal Code of Canada.

Companies involved should seek independent legal advice on whether or not they are in compliance with the Criminal Code and customs requirements.

For past exhibitions the following measures had been undertaken by exhibitors without incident:

1. The manufacturers/suppliers/exhibitors must ensure that:
 - All slot machines, video slots, video lottery terminals and related electronic gaming equipment will be displayed and operated in "demo" or "display" mode only. Demo or display mode being defined as "playable without a wager being made or any payouts being made."
 - All electronic slots, video slot, video lottery terminals and related electronic gaming equipment will be disabled as to prevent wagering or any payouts either by removing bill acceptors and token/coin acceptors or by removing hoppers and credit printers. The device may be sealed so that any attempt to tamper with the equipment or to replace those parts will be readily apparent and the equipment will be rendered inoperable. This does not prevent the manufacturer from opening the cabinet to show interior layout and construction.

2. A customs broker (Commerce Trade Show Logistics Ltd. per your email) will be used to import the gaming equipment from outside Canada and for subsequent export immediately following the conclusion of the said Exhibition.
3. The customs broker shall ensure that any Canada Border Services Agency requirements are complied with in respect to the import and subsequent export of the equipment.
4. The AGCO reserves the right to inspect all electronic gaming exhibits to ensure they are being displayed in conformity with the above requirements.
