RE: Canadian Gaming Summit, Calgary, Alberta, April 25-28, 2010

Dear Mr. Tory,

This will confirm the Alberta Gaming and Liquor Commission (AGLC) requirements with respect to electronic gaming machines to be brought to Calgary, Alberta, for the Canadian Gaming Summit to be held April 25-28, 2010.

Manufacturers/suppliers/exhibitors must ensure that any electronic gaming machines and equipment brought into Alberta for the Gaming Summit cannot be used to play a lottery scheme as defined in the Criminal Code. Measures that you should consider include:

1. All electronic gaming machines or equipment shall be displayed and operated in "demo" or "display" mode only, meaning that they are playable without a wager being made or any payouts being made.
2. All electronic gaming machines or equipment shall be disabled as to prevent wagering or any payouts either by removing bill acceptors and token/coin acceptors or by removing hoppers and credit printers. The machines should be configured so that any attempt to tamper with the equipment or to replace parts will be readily apparent and the equipment will be rendered inoperable. This should not prevent the opening of the cabinet to show the interior layout and construction.
3. The AGLC reserves the right to inspect all electronic machines and equipment to ensure they are displayed in accordance with the above conditions.
